Pure-Korean numbers one to ten are as follows:

하나 - (ha na) - one
둘 - (dul) - two
셋 - (saet) - three
넷 - (naet) - four
다섯 - (da seot) - five
여섯 - (yeo seot) - six
일곱 - (il gop) - seven
여덟 - (yeo deol) - eight
아홉 - (a hop) - nine
열 - (yeol) - ten

Sino-Korean numbers, which are based on Chinese, one to ten are as follows:

일 - (il) - one
이 - (ee) - two
삼 - (sam) - three
사 - (sa) - four
오 - (oh) - five
육 - (yuk) - six
칠 - (chil) - seven
팔 - (pal) - eight
구 - (ku) - nine
십 - (ship) - ten

Terminology:

경례 - *kyeongryae* - (kyoung ray) - bow
준비 - *junbi* - (junc bec) - ready
차렷 - *charyeot* - (cha r-ee-ot) - attention
그면 - *geumyeon* - (geu-mawu) - finish
하단 막기 - *hadan makki* (haw-den ma-kee) - low defense
전단 지르기 - *jeondan jireugi* (jun dan jee-reu-gee) - middle punch
기마세 - *kimasae* (key ma say) - basic riding stance for balance and power

Note: The "ㄷ" character in Korean has no literal English phonetical translation the official romanization of this character is "du". It is sort of like the throatal grunt sound that is left in your throat when you say a really hard "G".
